A. RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR AOS AND RIBBON JUDGING GOVERNING DISPLAYS AND PLANTS FOR THE SAGINAW VALLEY ORCHID SOCIETY SHOW.

Show rules will generally conform to the rules of the American Orchid Society on Shows and Judging as set forth in the "Handbook of Judging", Revised 2001, Show Manual of the Mid-America Orchid Congress, revised 2001 and general accepted show practices, except as otherwise noted. If a situation arises which is not covered by the specific rules below, it should be referred to the Show Chair. The Chair's decision will be final. When there are co-chairpersons, the decision of the co-chair on duty shall prevail.

1. Plants and arrangements must be entered for judging by 8:00 pm Friday. However, late entries may be displayed but will not be judged.
2. There will be five or more judges accredited by the American Orchid Society, Inc. These judges will follow the AOS system of judging and will judge all entries except those designated as flower arrangements or corsages. The Saginaw Valley Orchid Society will designate judges for the latter two categories, which typically will be accredited judges from the Michigan Federation of Garden Clubs. In addition, at the discretion of the AOS Judging Chair, additional orchidists may be invited to participate in ribbon judging only.
3. Judging will begin promptly at 8 am on Saturday.
4. Only authorized persons will be permitted in the show area during judging.

5. Judges have the right to award or withhold any scheduled prize. Judges may subdivide or create new categories when they determine it is warranted.
6. Staging or staging properties shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Tables will be furnished by the SVOS while supplies last. Requests must be made at least one week prior to the show.
7. Foliage plants, moss, driftwood, etc., may be used to enhance or supplement exhibits, but no artificial plants, flowers or foliage are permitted (except artificial grass when used as a floor covering for the exhibit. No flowering plants other than orchids will be permitted.
8. Due to limited electrical service at this location, there will be no outlets available for exhibits.
9. Damage to the premises resulting from the use of water or bad electrical connections by the exhibitors/vendors is the responsibility and liability of the exhibitor/vendor.
10. Name cards for exhibitors will be provided by the SVOS and will be placed on the exhibits following judging.
11. **All exhibit tags** will be removed from the displays following judging.
12. Except for first-bloom seedlings (class 101), miniatures (classes 26 & 100), and specimen plants (class 102), the same plant cannot be entered in more than one class.
13. A meristem plant or cut flower may not be entered as a seedling blooming for the first time.
14. In general, plants should be entered in the first applicable class. If in doubt, the Mid-America Orchid Congress Classification Schedule will be used as the authoritative reference. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to classify the plant correctly. Reclassifying entries: Incorrect entered plants/exhibits may be reclassified or disqualified at the discretion of the judges and/or show committee.
15. There is no limit to the number of plants entered by one exhibitor in any one class.
16. For the purpose of this show, the word "hybrid" means a cross made with the genus listed, unless preceded by the word "intergeneric", in which case two or more different genera are used in the cross.
17. In determining color for a class, the following guidelines will be employed: a) Blush colors and two tone flowers should be entered in the "other colors" classification, except Phaleanopsis which has a dedicated blush class. b) Color in paphiopedilum hybrids is based on the dominant flower color.
18. The SVOS will provide a display area for individuals wishing to submit single plants for judging.
19. For the purpose of this show, an amateur is defined as any person who has sold a total of not more than five hundred (500) plants and / or flowers in the past year.
20. In order to sell orchid plants and related materials at the show, an exhibitor must place an exhibit of at least 25 square feet in the show. It must conform to the quality standards of the show as established by the Show committee.
21. Cut orchid flowers are permitted in flowering plant exhibits solely as background or staging materials.
22. Exhibits, plants, cut flowers, arrangements, etc. must be officially registered by class with the registration committee prior to judging to be considered for awards. Flowering plants and cut flowers shall be considered equally by the judges. Decisions as to the proper category of entry shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor. In the event of a registration error, the judges may at their sole discretion submit the entry for consideration under the proper classification provided the new classification in question has not already been judged.
23. When exhibitors of cut flowers are unable to be present, SVOS members designated by the Show Chair or committee will attempt to display the material to best advantage.
24. Shipment of cut flowers for exhibition should be sent to the person selected by prior arrangement to display the blooms, or to the show chair.
25. **Exhibits may not be removed from the show prior to 4:00 pm Sunday.**
26. Every effort will be taken to insure the safety of orchid exhibits entered in the show, but the Saginaw Valley Orchid Society and the building owners/operators with which it contracts for the show cannot be responsible.
27. All flowers or exhibit materials not claimed by exhibitors at the end of the show will be presumed donations to charity and forwarded to charitable organizations.
28. During judging and show hours, all boxes, packing materials, etc., must be stored out of sight. Skirting for the commercial sales tables will be provided by SVOS. If exhibitors require special skirting material in order to complete a display, it shall be their responsibility.
29. In order to maintain order within the show area and provide fair access to all vendors, commercial exhibitors must confine their sales activity to the assigned table space. Extra plants for sale must be stored under the table, out of sight, and must not inhibit traffic flow or detract from the appearance of the show. Materials for sale are to be displayed only on the table surface assigned to a given commercial exhibitor. Raised racks or stands are permitted on the front table (maximum height 18") and on the back table (maximum height 6" from floor), must be stable and must not detract from sales area. In case of question, the show chair's decision shall be final.

AWARDS

Ribbon Awards

Ribbons will be awarded in all categories where the judges deem the entries are worthy. Show rules allow the judges to withhold awards if the entries do not merit them.

Boots Case Memorial Award for Phalaenopsis

This trophy will be displayed at the show and maintained by SVOS with the plant, year of award and recipient's name recorded on the trophy.

Edith Giesler Memorial Trophy for Paphiopedilum

This trophy will be displayed at the show and maintained by SVOS with the plant, year of award and recipient's name recorded on the trophy.

Don Garling Memorial Award for Society Display

Vivian View Memorial Award

This trophy is for the best in Amateur Competition Exhibit

Fred Case Memorial Award

The trophy is for the best in the Cattleya Alliance

Classes 1-9

Ribbons awarded by classes 1-9 will be the normal first, second and third place. Trophy ribbons will apply for these classes.

Class Trophies

Class Trophies will be awarded as noted in show schedule. A trophy ribbon and trophy will be given for each noted area (classes 10-99).

Best of Show

A Best of Show ribbon and trophy will be awarded by the judges when they identify a plant which, in their opinion, fully meets the commonly accepted standards of quality for Best of Show. All flowers in open competition for the show shall be eligible for this award.

AOS Show Trophy

The American Orchid Society Show Trophy may be awarded by the A.O.S. judges in accordance with A.O.S. regulations. To be eligible for the American Orchid Society Show Trophy for Outstanding Orchid Exhibit, the exhibit must be at least 25 square feet and contain at least five plants, orchids predominating. No restriction shall apply as to the class of exhibitor, whether amateur, commercial or professional florist.

SVOS Arrangement Rules

- Orchids must predominate and need not be grown by the exhibitor.
- Other flowers, foliage, plant materials and accessories are permitted in all classes of the arrangements and corsage divisions.
- All orchids, other flowers, and line material must be natural.
- All entries should be entered and ready for judging by the end of registration on Friday evening (8 p.m.) except for corsages and flower arrangements that are not in water. These entries must be registered and in place by 7:30 a.m. Saturday. If possible, list flowers and other material used.
- No entry may be removed from the show before 4:00 p.m. Sunday.
- Entries and choice of class must be made by the exhibitor (an exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired).
- The exhibitor shall make the determination of whether or not to enter the novice class and shall make all entries in that class, whether for arrangements or corsages. The novice class is for someone who has never won a blue ribbon at this show.
- Comments by the judges will be exposed to the public after judging is completed.
- All entries are eligible for ribbon awards in their categories. Judges have the discretion of withholding a first-, second-, or third-place ribbon if, in their opinion, no entry within the given category meets judging standards.
